- 3. VSCA is committed to providing professional development and holding frank conversations to assist school counselors in recognizing and understanding the impact of racism and white privilege in our schools and society; and
- 4. VSCA is committed to evaluating our organization's current practices and continually striving to be better, do better, and grow together.

VSCA expects school counselors to uphold our ethical code by advocating and leading efforts for sustainable change, including being an accomplice to anti-racism. As such, we will look inward to examine our own perspectives as well as our implicit and explicit biases in an effort to strive for continued growth. We will listen and hold space for our colleagues, students, staff, and families of color. We will collaborate with school leaders and stakeholders to examine and

dismantle the existing racism, inequities, and access gaps in our schools and districts. And, we will work together for a more just and inclusive society.
